








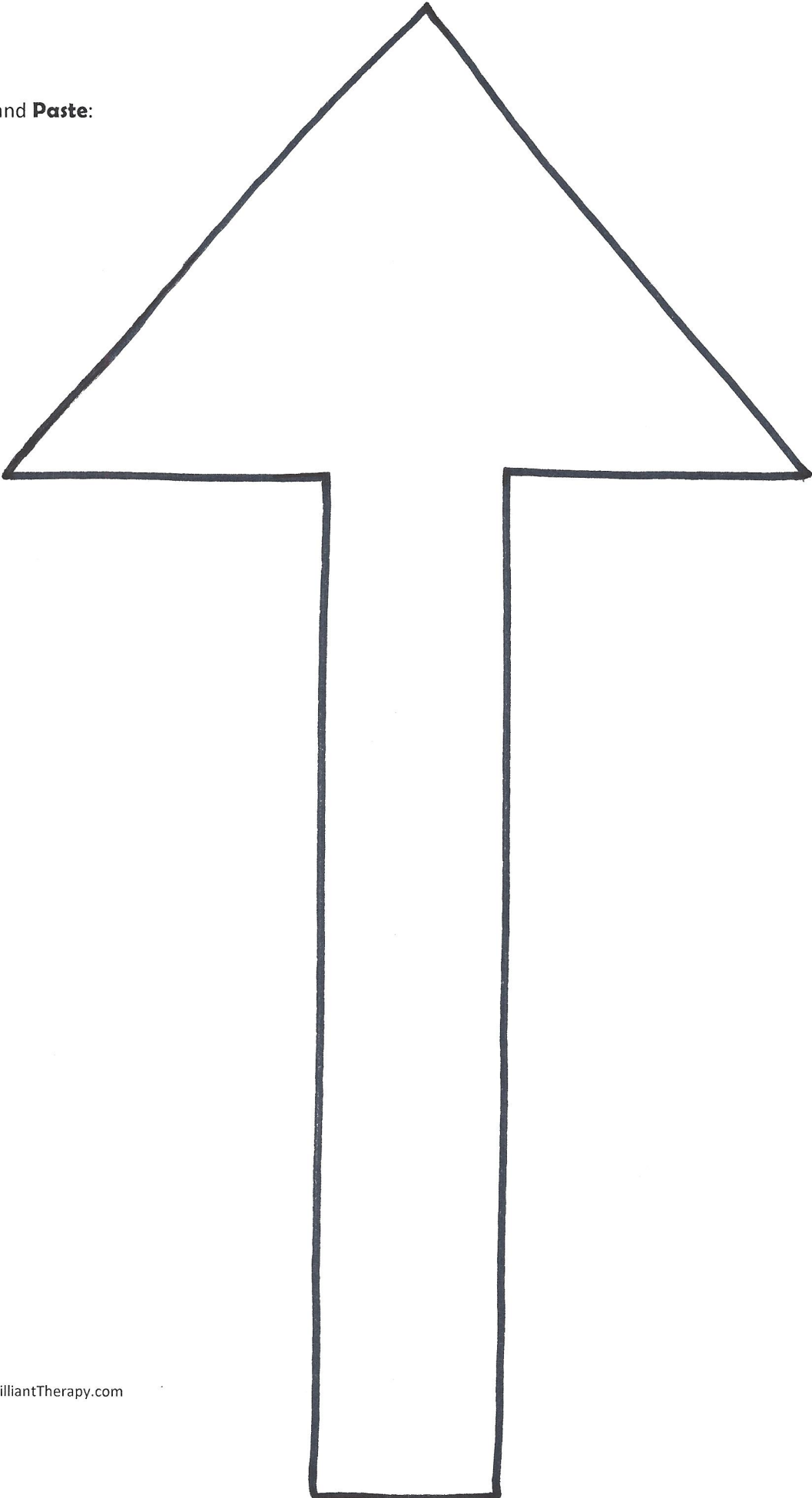
## ARROW GAME IDEAS:

1. Kids stand up and move designated (hand, feet,...) body part/s in the direction the arrow/s is pointed.
2. Place an item in the room and have kids find the item on just watching where arrow/s are pointing.
  3. Participants sit in circle. Call out the first thing they see that the arrow is pointing to.
  4. Arrows placed around room. Kids write down each item that an arrow is pointing to.
5. Arrows placed around the room. Each participant calls out what the arrow is pointing to. You may choose to use a timer so participants can try improving their time.
6. Call out a letter, color or subject and everyone places their arrow directing towards it.
  7. Place arrows on the floor and direct them on a path or obstacle course.
  8. Place arrows on the floor in an infinity (8) pattern and walk it.
9. Place arrows on the floor so participants know where to go in an obstacle course.
10. Leader calls out items in the room, and everyone points their arrow to it.
11. Have kids place their arrows on a path together and then try walking it.
12. Using a timer, see how fast participants can arrange the arrows in a demonstrated pattern.
